BEBINGTON BOYS 'VAULT' TO THE TOP

The Wirral Secondary Schools Gymnastics Floor & Vault Competition was held on Wednesday 24th March at Bebington High Sports College.

Students from schools across the Wirral took part, competing against each other. Everyone was impressed by the way the competition was organised, with medals being given to some amazing gymnasts.

Bebington High Sports College had two boys competing in this year's competition, Sam Burke and Kurtis Solheim. Both Year 8 students showed how much they had improved and how strong their performance was by taking 1st and 2nd place in both the Floor and Vault competitions.

The students, who have been regularly training twice a week at the school, during Breakfast Club with their Bebington High Sports Colleges Community Gym Coach, Sue Flanagan, deservedly became the overall winners of the competition.

Sam claimed 1st Gold medal and Kurtis gained the Silver medal against Cald Grammar and Hilbre High School. The students were a true credit to the school.



NORTH WEST VOLLEYBALL STARS

Two sisters, Ola and Agata Potocka from Bebington High Sports College, were the only girls from Merseyside that were selected to represent the North West region in England's Volleyball Inter-Regional Championships. The Championship is volleyball's biggest national junior competition with representative teams from nine English regions and Wales, was held at volleyball's National Centre at Kettering over two days - 1st May & 2nd May.

Agata played for North West girls Under 16's team, alongside girls from Manchester, Lancashire and Cheshire, while her sister, Ola, played for the North West Under 14's B team (regions enter A and B teams in this tournament).

Agata's team won the Under 16 event, to become the North West 2010 Inter-regional champions beating teams from Wales, the North East, East Midlands and London in their qualifying pool. They then went on to beat the South West team in the final competition, a very close match which went to three sets with the North West just beating the South West at the finish - set scores 15-25, 25-19, 16-14.

Ola's team also got to the final in their pool, but lost to a strong Yorkshire team in the final - set scores 10-25, 25-18, 11-15.



Miss Ellerington

47% of students gain 5 top grades at GCSE including English and Maths, which is a 13% rise on last years results.

For the past 6 years Bebington High Sports College has been improving the achievement of its students to record levels for the school, well exceeding the target set for Bebington High Sports College by the Department for Education.

The improvements made over the last two years, however can only be considered as awesome. We achieved a 27% rise in the number of our students gaining 5 top grades at GCSE. Now 80% of our students gain these top grades, and also over 60% of our students gaining grade C and above in English and Maths. This places the school in the top 25% of schools nationally.

CONGRATULATIONS

Brian Jordan, Headteacher says that these results are a testament to the hard work of all our students and staff. They demonstrate that our vision of having happy well cared for students to achieve their best. I wish to take this opportunity to thank all the staff and the parents for their continued hard work and support for our young people. I would also like to say WELL DONE to our students for believing in themselves and working hard to realise their potential.



SCHOOL NEWS

As expected, we received a visit from Ofsted recently and gained a very good report. Of the 31 judgements made, over half were judged to be good or outstanding. It is well known that our school places an enormous emphasis on ensuring our students are safe and well looked after, leading them to be happy and having the ability to believe that they can achieve well, despite the possibility that they were disappointed following their tests at age 11.

I was, therefore, especially pleased that Ofsted judged our 'Pastoral Care' to be Outstanding along with our emphasis on ensuring that our students are safe.

In fact this was the first time that the Ofsted team had awarded a grade of outstanding for 'safeguarding'. We are also the only school in the whole of Wirral who have achieved this judgement, at a time when Ofsted places a huge emphasis on this area.

I was immensely proud of, not only the 70 students that were interviewed by Ofsted, but also their survey answers where they reported that they have a high regard for their school, feel safe, behave well and are keen to support each other. Our parents also showed tremendous support for the school, and I wish to thank them for this, as a school can only be successful with their help.

Our curriculum was highly commended for its innovation, allowing all of our students to maximise their learning and achievement. This has been a major focus for development over the last six years, which has led to transformational improvements in the students' successes placing the school in the top 25% of all schools nationally.

Our aim for the school was to be in the top 25% of schools in September, which is a tremendous achievement for an all ability school that is in a selective catchment area.

Another area of success has been our Sports Specialism which was again highly commended, not only in the way we support our students, but also the whole community.

In summary Bebington High Sports College is an excellent school where the students are well cared for and more than achieve their potential.

CHINESE DAY IN LIVERPOOL



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In order to support cultural awareness and understanding of China, and as part of the REAL programme, the whole of Year 7 went to visit Liverpool's Chinese community, in March this year. The visit was sponsored by MerseyTravel who kindly donated train passes to all the students.

The students visited China Gate and observed the impressive arch which is almost 50 feet high and is reputed to be the largest of its type in Europe. The Gate commemorates the twinning of Shanghai with Liverpool. Having walked to the Victoria Galleries and Museum at Liverpool University, the students were treated to fan dancing, Kung Fu, T'ai Chi and a talk on the Shanghai Expo, as well as learning a little more of the Chinese language. All the activities were prepared and performed by the Confucius Centre, as part of our continuing link with the Centre and were thoroughly enjoyed by the students.

Having worked up an appetite, all 115 students and 14 staff then took over the whole of a restaurant in China Town to sample the delights of a Chinese buffet. All the students excitedly tried new foods, experienced eating with chopsticks and thoroughly enjoyed the day.

The influence that China has on the world economy is increasing and it is important that we do all we can to prepare our young people for life in a multicultural society. The students will use their experiences from this day to complete their project on China, which will culminate in a video documentary, produced and edited by the students themselves. Bebington High Sports College has also recently opened their own Confucius unit which provides a learning point within the school for Chinese culture, language, theatre, history, art, food and music. The centre is run twice a week for an hour, with the aim of focusing on new and innovative ways of teaching and learning and offering students a chance to develop their skills, experiences and open up new horizons for their future.

Confucius said that "alongside knowledge you should have time to think. It is not just about acquisition of knowledge but about respect for the importance of education and the family" and this flows together with the ethos of the school, sending out an important message of building up relationships and caring for the community.

As ever, students represented the school incredibly well during the trip. Members of the public commented on how quiet they were, appropriately behaved plus respectful whilst travelling on the train to and from the event and when watching the thrilling performances. 9

BOWLED OVER BY CRICKET VISIT



Bebington High Sports College recently had a visit from former international Zimbabwean cricketer Henry Olonga, who entered the record books as the first ever black cricketer to play for Zimbabwe. Olonga who could generate speeds of 90mph regularly, was also the youngest ever Zimbabwean to play for his country.

The purpose of his visit, aided by Wirral Youth for Christ, was to speak to Bebington High Sports College students about sport, politics and christianity and in particular, how Henry sacrificed his position within cricket and his country to do something he hoped would make a difference.

The students of the Sports Council at Bebington High were enthralled by how his black armband protest, to denote the "death of democracy", with colleague Andy Flower, against Robert Mugabe at the 2003 opening game of the World Cup, saw him branded a traitor, sentenced to death in his absence and forced to dramatically flee his homeland, sending his family into hiding.

Henry explained to students that the most difficult thing for him as a sportsman was facing the potential consequences of their actions and how he had to come to terms with it. He explained that his beliefs as a Christian helped him to realise that if you believe strongly about something you know is right, then you need to follow that path.

The Student Sports Council then quizzed Henry about issues surrounding his life. Henry spoke of his love of travelling, how he now plays for a club called 'Lashings' which is an all-star cricket team, similar to basketball's "Harlem Globetrotters". With their motto of "fun, first and foremost" and wearing their unique black and gold clothing, they aim to raise the profile of cricket throughout the world while helping others less fortunate.

Headteacher Mr Brian Jordan said "It was an awe inspiring talk by Mr Olonga. Cricket is one of the most universal sports around and our students saw how passionate Henry was, not only about cricket, but also his faith and humanity".

Before he left, the star chatted to students, explaining how to use sport to build bridges in life. It was a brilliant day; a perfect innings for the Bebington High Sports College students.

MEND - Mind, Exercise, Nutrition....Do it!!!





WHY SCIENCE

"I thought it was going to be boring but actually it was really good!"

Students from Bebington High Sports College were given an exciting opportunity to see the vast range of career possibilities that are accessible to them by taking GCE advanced levels in Science. The seven Year 9 students went to a "Why Science" conference at the CLC to take part in four interactive workshops and also a "Meet the scientist" research activity.

The conference was aimed at students who have the potential to take advanced levels but have not decided to take science for post 16 education. The activities they took part in were designed to help students make up their minds by providing information about the range of opportunities that are open to them.

The budding scientists of Bebington High Sports College were actively involved by helping build a large model of a molecule of carbon called the Buckminster Fullerene and also by making a model of the Maglev train, which has no fuel or pollution, it uses wind turbine for propulsion into space therefore will hopefully be the 'transport of the future'.

The session really brought to life the excitement of Science and was put to the students in a way that they could relate to and the impact of this was amazing!

"I thought it was going to be boring but actually it was really good!" said one of the students on the way out. University life now seems a lot more interesting to these excited students than it did before!

As a sports college we are the hub of sports development within our family of schools, where we exceed all sporting and leisure targets set by national government.
